HIDDEN GEMS AND FORGOTTEN PEOPLE



ROBERT HILL HANNA VC (1887–1967)

Robert Hanna was born in Kilkeel, Ireland on 6 August 1886, and came to Canada in 1905. He joined the Canadian Expeditionary Force in November 1914, and by the summer of 1917 was a Company Sergeant-Major (CSM) serving with the 29th Infantry Battalion.

On 21 August 1917 CSM Hanna's company was attempting to overpower a German strongpoint on Hill 70, near Lens in France. For the bravery and leadership he demonstrated that day, Hanna received the Victoria Cross. The citation read -

On August 21, 1917, at Hill 70, Lens, France, Company Sergeant-Major Hanna's company met with most severe enemy resistance at a heavily protected strong point, which had beaten off three assaults and all the officers of the company had become casualties. This warrant officer, under heavy machinegun and rifle fire, coolly collected and led a party against the strong point, rushed through the wire and personally killed four of the enemy, capturing the position and silencing the machine-gun. This courageous action was responsible for the capture of a most important tactical point.

Robert Hanna died in Mount Lehman, British Columbia on 15 June 1967.
